Public Libraries Section

Earlier this year, I was the proud recipient of a scholarship from VLA. This scholarship was used to take a collection management class through Northern Kentucky University – the final class I needed to complete my requirements for certification in Vermont. Many thanks to the Vermont Library Association for helping to make that happen!

There were only two of us taking the class, making for lots of individual attention and discussion. Topics for each week included procedures and sources for selecting and acquiring print and electronic materials, material selection policies, material reservation techniques, publishing practices that impact library budgets and operations, weeding criteria and disposal of materials, consortial collection building, material repairs, intellectual freedom, and challenges to library materials.

The other student was a paraprofessional in a library in

Massachusetts. She and I shared many ideas on varying library topics. Her feeling was that “working in a public library is a wonderful career, you never know what the day will bring.”

The most interesting conversation came about during the week where weeding was discussed. We all love books but at some point, hard decisions must be made about which items should remain on our shelves and which items should move on. How many times have you thought to yourself, “But I just bought that!” and then realized it was 10 years ago? It was suggested that weeding can actually increase circulation because the items that remain stand out more and are easier to find. So we put that to the test.

Our youth librarian did a thorough weed of our YA section. Each shelf was so full that there was no more room to add new books. Books were laid on top of other books and we used the roof of the bookshelf for additional shelving space. After the weed, all of the books from the top of the shelf were gone. Books that were torn or very old and worn were removed as well as books that hadn’t circulated since the library automated.

The books now fit nicely on the shelves and there is now room to display items at the end of each shelf. We’ve received numerous compliments on how nice the section looks now and we’ve caught more people browsing the section. But the proof is in the numbers. Circulation of our YA section is now up 54% from before the weed.

We are excited to continue this process in other sections of the library. Though sometimes there are books you just can’t bear to part with. We found one book in our adult fiction section that has been in our library since September 15, 1923. It has been in this building for 93 years, and is almost as old as the building itself. It now sits in a place of honor on our shelf in the office as a symbol of sorts of where we came from and where we are heading. “Books are not absolutely dead things,” wrote John Milton in 1644 in *Areopagitica*. It signifies the words and meanings contained within. A book and the library in which it is housed are more than its contents alone but weeding some of those contents will help the library’s other materials spring to life even more!
